

Project SCORE (Signal Communications by Orbiting Relay Equipment) produced the first teleprinter signals from space. The first US Air Force satellite attempt placed the 8800-lb 185-ft Atlas ICBM into orbit. The liquid-fueled, 359,000-lb thrust, radio-inertial guided missile was placed into orbit from Cape Canaveral, Fla, and orbited every 101 minutes at 17,000 mph at altitudes between 114 and 925 miles. This world's first space radio relay station functioned as a link in an experimental global communications system. About 3:29 pm EST Dec 20 1958 the California ground station at Prado Dam Basin, Corona, triggered the satellite, which then transmitted the pre-recorded voice of the president. Corona then sent up an RTTY signal, which was relayed directly and received at the listening post station at Ft Sam Houston, Texas clearly with only two short fades. Other stations in Arizona and Georgia received the same signals. The message was:

THIS IS THE USASRDL (U. S. ARMY SIGNAL RESEARCH AND DEVELOP-MENT LABORATORY) SATELLITE TRACKING STATION AT PRADO DAM BASIN, CORONA, CALIF., TRANSMITTING TO THE SATELLITE. THIS IS THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES SPEAKING. THROUGH THE MARVELS OF SCIENTIFIC ADVANCE, MY VOICE IS COMING TO YOU FROM A SATELLITE TRAVELING IN OUTER SPACE. MY MESSAGE IS A SIMPLE ONE. THROUGH THIS UNIQUE MEANS I CONVEY TO YOU AND TO ALL MANKIND AMERICA'S WISH FOR PEACE ON EARTH AND GOOD WILL TOWARD MEN EVERYWHERE.

On the next pass (the 28th) the Corona station retransmitted the message to the satellite, which stored the message on magnetic tape about 5 pm. At 5:10 pm, as the satellite traveled east, the Signal Corps station at Ft Sam Houston directed the satellite to broadcast back to earth what it had received over California. The president's words were received loud and clear both at Ft Sam Houston and at the station at Ft Stewart near Savannah, Ga. On the 29th pass the same experiment was repeated, the California station sending a 4-minute message at 6:55. The same station then commanded the satellite to repeat the message, which was heard by the Texas and Ft Huachuca, Arizona stations, and partially by the Georgia station. The communications equipment was developed for about \$200,000 by the US Army Signal Research and Development Laboratory, Ft Monmouth, NJ. Two complete 35-1b communications packages each contained a 1-3 8x5" beacon transmitter (107.938 or 107.97 Mc), a 6-1/4x4-1/4x4-1/2" communications transmitter (132.435 or 132.905 Mc), a 3-1/2x4-1/2xl" receiver, a magnetic tape recorder, a 4-5/8x3-7/8x1-3/4" control unit, and a 4-1/8x9-3/4x2" dc-dc converter. Batteries were zinc-silver. Radio Frequency Laboratories, Inc, Boonton, NJ developed the ground-based telegraph multiplex equipment.

SOME NOTES ON RTTY

ADIOTELETYPE operation on the amateur bands is a rapidly growing activity, and the RTTY enthusiasts constantly are seeking new methods of improving their techniques. With the advent of S.S.B. transmitters with their required high degree of frequency stability, this group began to explore methods of adapting this equipment to their specialty.

T FIRST, the simplest scheme was to feed an audio frequency shift signal into the audio system. If the input audio signals are perfect sine waves, and the transmitter audio amplifier and balanced modulators free of distortion, the r.f. output signal, under S.S.B. operation, would be a clean C.W. carrier shifted in accordance with the audio input keying frequency. However, any harmonic distortion present from the A.F.S.K. source will appear as spurious C.W. signals. Distortion in the transmitter proper will also appear as spurious C.W. signals. To eliminate these problems, some owners of commercial transmitters have added diode frequency shifters to the V.F.O. of the S.S.B. transmitter. While these diode shifters work, they may cause frequency drift in the V.F.O. Furthermore, the frequency shift will not be constant as the V.F.O. is changed in frequency.

PREFERABLE system is to shift the frequency of a quartz crystal heterodyning oscillator in the S.S.B. transmitter. If the proper oscillator is chosen, the shift will be constant, regardless of the final output frequency of the transmitter. In most cases spurious signals will no longer be a problem. In addition, the excellent frequency stability of the V.F.O. will not be impaired.

7_{N HALLICRAFTERS} HT-32 transmitters the side band inverting crystal controlled oscillators can be easily revised for this arrangement by adding a small capacitor across the highest frequency crystal to move it 850 C.P.S. After modification, the removal of a plug-in adapter restores the HT-32 to its normal operation for S.S.B., A.M. or C.W.

FIELD SERVICE bulletin describing this modification in detail is being prepared and will be available upon request.

W7HRC Harold Wade advises that about 12 Model 26 are available in Seattle area. Price is \$50 plus \$8.50 crating charge. W7HRC waiver form required. Pacific Telephone policy on prainters returned by subscribers is: lst, reassign to other subscribers, 2nd, reuse in the region or area, 3rd make available to local societies under contract assuring the machines will never

be used in commercial competition. 4th, smash up for scrap metal. Part 3 of the Pacific program has been skipped in other parts of the country and thousands of usable machines have come under the hammer. Such a destruction is a considerable loss. Amateur and experimental use of teleprinters can never grow like SSB until an even flow of machines reasonably priced from several sources is available. is coming when huge volume of emergency traffic can be handled by amateur radioprinter. of the best reasons for amateur radio is its self training of thousands of people for possfuture war service in knowing what's behind the buttons. We are sure AT&T wants us to win the next war, but a little more co-operation in making castoff machines available would be a great help in the amateur selftraining field.






