A Short History of TDI

It was just ten years ago this month that a group of deaf people in Salt Lake City, Utah, were excited and thrilled with a newfound ability to make unassisted telephone calls. Using early experimental models of the Phonotype developed by Robert H. Weitbrecht, along with two Model 19 teletypewriters loaned by Mountain Bell Telephone Company, those present happily typed back and forth to each other between two rooms in the Hotel Utah.

From this little beginning, and using what equipment could be found, the system grew slowly over the next three and a half years while the concept was being perfected. In 1968 the development was given a tremendous boost when the American Telephone and Telegraph Company agreed to donate, through several of its operating companies, surplus teletypewriters (TTYs) to deaf people through the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf, Inc. Also in that year individuals from the National Association of the Deaf and the Alexander Graham Bell Association formed Teletypewriters for the Deaf, Inc. (TDI) as a non-profit organization. Operating through a group of Authorized Agents (now numbering over 100) TDI handles the logistics associated with picking up the TTYs from distributing points, storing and reconditioning them, and finally placing them in the homes of deaf people. It is also responsible for securing the signed waiver documents required by AT&T. In 1973 the Western Union Telegraph Company began the distribution of substantial numbers of machines to deaf people. Other sources of equipment have been International Telephone and Telegraph Company, RCA World Communications, government surplus sources and interested individuals.

TDI publishes an International Telephone Directory of the Deaf which will soon carry 4000 listings, a far cry from its first "directory" in 1968 which was a typed sheet bearing 174 listings. The current directory lists stations in Canada, England and the Philippine Islands. It also carries several hundred listings of schools, colleges and other organizations serving deaf people, including many Vocational Rehabilitation offices.

The initial development and continuing growth of the TDI system utilized Phonotypes I and II of the Applied Communications Corporation (later replaced by models III and IV). 1969 saw the introduction of couplers by ESSCO Communications and Ivy Electronics. The above devices interface between the telephone and the teletypewriter which types "hard copy" on paper. TTY models in the system include Teletype Corporation Models 14, 15 (mostly), 19, 26, 28, and 32; Kleinschmidt, Creed, Lorenz, Mite; as well as the 100 series of Western Union. In 1972 and 1973 telecommunications terminals utilizing transitory readout were introduced by the Phonics and HAL Corporations (CRT readout) and by SICO, Inc. (LED readout). All of the above mentioned devices utilize the 5-level Baudot code at 60 words per minute, a consequence of the characteristics of the surplus teletypewriters available. This system appears to more than adequately meet the communication needs of deaf people.

TDI was controlled by a Board of Directors of three people from its founding until 1973 when the bylaws were revised to increase the number to nine, who are

elected by the membership. Officers of TDI are in turn elected by the Board of Directors.

In 1969 TDI, as an Indiana not-for-profit corporation received its tax exemption letter from the Internal Revenue Service. The IRS, in 1971, agreed that the cost of specialized equipment permitting deaf people to use the telephone is tax deductible as a medical expense. This ruling was later broadened to include costs of service and upkeep . . . In 1973 the agreement between AT&T and A. G. Bell was replaced by one between AT&T and TDI.

In order to encourage participation TDI has attempted to keep its enrollment and membership fees as low as possible. This has resulted in a financial loss each year due to rising costs. Contributions from concerned individuals and corporations have almost, but not quite made up the difference. Financial solvency has come from the backlog of a grant made in 1968 by the Lilly Endowment, Inc. In 1973 the Lilly Endowment made a second, but restricted, grant for the purpose of making loans to agents for the purpose of acquiring teletypewriters and associated equipment, and for the reproduction of out-of-print service manuals. A service manual designed especially for deaf people is now in the planning stage—indeed it might be available at this convention.

In addition to interpersonal communication, the ability of deaf people to use the telephone has resulted in auxiliary services such as installations of TTYs in police and fire departments, news and weather services and similar facilities.

In short, the last ten years have resulted in fulfillment of the promise revealed to those in Utah ten years ago. The ability of deaf people to carry out unaided telephone communication has resulted in feelings of excitement, independence and peace of mind which has contributed significantly to their welfare.

Constitution and By-Laws Teletypewriters for the Deaf

BY-LAWS

(Adopted June 10, 1968; Revised March 11, 1973)

Article I — Name

The name of this corporation shall be TELETYPEWRITERS FOR THE DEAF, INC.

Article I — Name

Article II — Purpose

Article II — Purpose

The purposes of this corporation for which it is formed shall be:

- A. To function as a central organization for the acquisition and distribution of teletypewriters and other communication devices for the use of deaf persons.
- B. To maintain a national register of telephone-teletypewriter installations for deaf people and to publish an annual listing of such stations, provided that they are members of the corporation.
- C. To encourage the development of appropriate community services for deaf people which involve telephonic communication.
- D. To carry out such other purposes and programs which the membership shall from time to time deem appropriate.

Article III — Membership and Dues

- A. Any person may become a member of this corporation by paying such enrollment fees and annual membership fees that may be recommended by the Board of Directors and approved by the members. Annual membership fees shall be due and payable on the 15th of August of each year.
- B. Any member in default in payment of dues shall be ipso facto suspended from all privileges of membership, and if, after notice, such default be not cured within a period of ninety days, the membership of such member shall automatically cease and terminate.
- C. Any member may be removed from membership by a majority vote of the membership present at any annual meeting or at any special meeting of the members called for that purpose, for conduct deemed prejudicial to this corporation, provided, that such member shall have first been served with written notices of the accusations against him, and shall have been given an opportunity to produce witnesses, if any, and to be heard, at the meeting at which such vote is taken.

Article IV — Meetings

Section 1. Annual meetings of the members shall be held each year on the second Friday in May at eight o'clock P.M., the purpose of which shall be the election of a Board of Directors and the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the meeting.

Section 2. Any and all meetings of the members and the Board of Directors of this corporation shall be held at such place as may be designated by resolution adopted by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. At least thirty days prior to the date fixed by Section 1 of this Article for the holding of the annual meeting of members, written notice of the time and place of such meeting shall be mailed, as hereinafter provided, to each member entitled to vote at such meeting and such notices shall include a proxy form.

Section 4. — Delayed Annual Meeting. If, for any reason, the annual meeting of the members shall not be held on the day hereinbefore designated, such meetings may be called and held as a special meeting, and the same proceedings may be had there as at an annual meeting, provided however, that the notice of such meeting shall be the same herein required for the annual meeting, namely not less than a 30 day notice.

The order of business at the annual meeting of members shall be as follows:

- (a) Roll call,
- (b) Reading notice and proof of mailing,
- (c) Reading the minutes of the last preceding meeting,
- (d) Report of the President,
- (e) Report of the Secretary,
- (f) Report of the Treasurer,
- (g) Transaction of other business mentioned in the notice,
- (h) Election of directors,
- (i) Adjournment,

provided that, in the absence of any objection, the presiding officer may vary the order of business at his discretion.

Section 5. A special meeting of the members may be called at any time by the president, or by a majority of the Board of Directors. The method by which such meeting may be called is as follows: Upon receipt of a specification in writing setting forth the date and objects of such proposed meeting, signed by the president, or by a majority of the Board of Directors, the secretary or an assistant secretary shall prepare, sign and mail a notice of such meeting to all members at least 15 days prior to such meeting. Such notice may be signed by the stamped, typewritten or printed signature of the secretary and shall state the purpose of such meeting. It shall also include a proxy form.

Section 6. At the place of holding the annual meeting of the members and immediately following the same, the Board of Directors as constituted upon final adjournment of such annual meeting shall convene for the purpose of electing officers and transacting any other business properly brought before it, provided, that the organization meeting in any year may be held at a different time and place that herein provided, by consent of a majority of the directors of such new board.

Section 7. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at least once per year at such time and place as the board shall from time to time determine.

Section 8. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the president at any time by means of such written notice by mail of the time, place and purpose thereof to each director as the president in his discretion shall deem sufficient but actoin taken at any such meeting shall not be invalidated for want of notice if such notice shall have been waived as hereinafter provided.

Section 9. All notices required to be given by any provision of these By-Laws shall state the authority pursuant to which they are issued (as, "by order of the president," or "by order of the Board of Directors" as the case may be) and shall bear the written, stamped, typewritten, or printed signature of the secretary. Every notice shall be deemed duly served when the same has been deposited in the United States mail, with postage fully prepaid, plainly addressed to the addressee at his, her, or its last address appearing upon the membership record of this corporation.

Section 10. Notice of the time, place, and purpose of any meeting of the members or special meeting of the members may be waived by teletypewriter, telegram, or other writing, either before or after such meeting has been held.

Section 11. Any members of this corporation who is unable to attend a regular or special meeting of the members may designate a proxy to vote in his stead on a form provided with the notice of meeting and may indicate on the proxy how his vote is to be cast on any matter contained in the notice of said meeting. Proxies may be revoked at any time on written notice to the secretary or by personal appearance of the member at the meeting.

Article V — Voting and Elections

Section 1. Except as may otherwise be provided, each member shall, at every meeting of the members, be entitled to vote in person or by proxy upon each subject properly submitted to a vote.

Section 2. No proxy shall be deemed operative unless and until signed by the member and filed with the corporation. In the absence of limitation to the contrary contained in the proxy, the same shall extend to all meetings of the members and shall remain in force one year from its date, and no longer, or until revoked by the member.

Section 3. Whenever any person entitled to vote at a meeting of the members shall request the appointment of inspectors, a majority of the members present at such meeting and entitled to vote thereat shall appoint not more than three inspectors, who need not be members. If the right of any person to vote at such meeting shall be challenged, the inspectors shall determine such right. The inspectors shall receive and count the votes either upon election or for the decision of any question and shall determine the result. Their certificate of any vote shall be prima facie evidence thereof.

Article VI — Board of Directors and Executive Committee

Section 1.

A. The business, property, and affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors composed of nine persons who shall be members of this corporation. Each director shall hold office for the term for which he is elected and until his successor is elected and qualified.

B. One director shall be elected from each of six regions as established elsewhere in these by-laws, and three directors at-large.

C. Enlargement of the original board of directors from three to nine shall be accomplished through election by the original board, as provided elsewhere in these by-laws.

D. The nine directors shall elect a president, a vice-president, a secretary, and a treasurer for a term of one year. The president and vice-president shall be elected from among the nine directors but the other two officers need not be. They shall serve at the pleasure of the Board of Directors.

E. The president, secretary and treasurer shall constitute the Executive Committee. They shall act for the Board of Directors in the day-to-day management of the business of the corporation in accordance with general policies set by the board.

F. Directors shall serve a term of three years. Initially, one director at-large and the directors from two regions as specified by the Board of Directors shall be elected for a term of one, two, and three years. Thereafter, all directors will be elected for terms of three years.

G. The Board of Directors shall, from time to time, apportion the states into the six regions to best fit the natural dwelling patterns of members.

Section 2. Vacancies in the board of directors shall be filled by appointment made by the remaining directors. Each person so elected to fill a vacancy shall remain a director until his successor has been elected by the members, who may make such election at their next annual meeting or at any special meeting duly called for that purpose and held prior thereto.

Section 3. If and when directors shall severally or collectively consent in writing to any action to be taken by the corporation, such action shall be as valid corporate action as though it had been authorized at a meeting of the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The Board of Directors shall have power to appoint such other officers and agents as the Board may deem necessary to transact the business of the corporation.

Section 5. Any officer or agent may be removed by the Board of Directors whenever in the judgement of the Board the business interests of the corporation will be served thereby.

Section 6. The Board shall have power to fill any vacancy in any office occurring from any reason whatsoever.

Section 7. For any reason deemed sufficient by the Board of Directors, whether occasioned by absence or otherwise, the Board may delegate all or any of the powers and duties of any officers to any other officer or director, but no officer or director shall execute, acknowledge, or verify any instrument in more than one capacity.

Section 8. The Board of Directors may require any officer or agent to file with the corporation a satisfactory bond conditioned for faithful performance of his duties.

Section 9. The compensation of the directors, officers, agents, and other employees may be fixed by the Board.

Section 10. The Board of Directors shall have full power and authority to borrow money whenever in the discretion of the Board the exercise of said power is required in the general interests of this corporation, and in such case, the Board of Directors may authorize the proper officers of this corporation to make, execute, and deliver in the name and behalf of this corporation such notes, bonds, and other evidence of indebtedness as said Board shall deem proper, and said Board shall have full power to mortgage the property of this corporation or any part thereof, as security for such indebtedness, and no action on the part of the membership of this corporation shall be requisite to the validity of such note, bond, evidence of indebtedness, or mortgage.

Article VII — Officers, Duties

Section 1.

A. The President shall be the chief executive officer of the corporation. He shall preside over all meetings of the Board and of the members. He shall have general and active management of the business of the corporation and shall see that orders and resolutions of the Board are carried into effect. He shall be an ex-officio member of all standing committees except the nominating committee and shall have the general powers and duties of supervision and management usually vested in the office of president of a corporation.

B. He shall with the approval of the Board of Directors appoint a Nominating Committee at least six (6) months prior to the annual meeting.

Section 2. The vice-president shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the president during the disability or absence of the president when such absence is likely to be temporary but shall call a special meeting of the Board when such absence is to be permanent for the purpose of electing a president.

Section 3. The secretary shall attend all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors, and of the Executive Committee, and shall preserve in books of the corporation true minutes of the proceedings of all such meetings. He shall safely keep in his custody the seal of the corporation and shall have authority to affix the same to all instruments where its use is required. He shall perform such other duties as may be delegated to him by the Board of Directors or by the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The treasurer shall have custody of all corporate funds and securities and shall keep in books belonging to the corporation full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements. He shall deposit all monies, securities, and other valuable effects in the name of the corporation in such depositories as may be designated for that purpose by the Board of Directors. He shall disburse funds of the corporation as may be ordered by the Board, taking proper vouchers for such disbursements, and shall render to the president and directors at the regular meetings of the Board and whenever requested by them, an account of all his transactions as treasurer and of the financial condition of the corporation. If required by the Board he shall deliver to the president of the corporation, and shall keep in force, a bond in form, amount and with surety or sureties satisfactory to the Board, conditioned for faithful performance of the duties of his office, and for restoration to the corporation in case of his death, resignation, retirement, or removal from office, of all books, papers, vouchers, money, and property of whatever kind in his possession or under his control belonging to the corporation.

Section 5. All checks, drafts, and order for payment of money shall be signed in the name of the corporation by such officers or agents as the Board of Directors shall from time to time designate for that purpose.

Section 6. When the execution of any contract, conveyance, or other instrument has been authorized without specification of the executing officers, the president, the secretary, and the treasurer may execute the same in the name and behalf of this corporation and may affix the corporate seal thereto. The Board of Directors shall have the power to designate the officers and agents who have authority to execute any instrument in behalf of this corporation.

Article VIII — Chapters

Section 1.

A. A group of members residing in a specific locality may band together for the purpose of forming a chapter to further the interests of this corporation and its members.

B. Such a chapter shall be named after the locality it represents.

C. It may adopt its own by-laws but such by-laws must be submitted to the Board of Directors of this corporation for approval and no such by-law that is in conflict with any contract the corporation may have with other bodies nor any by-law that is likely to be detrimental to the corporation shall be approved. Otherwise chapters shall have full control of their internal affairs and the corporation likewise assumes no responsibility for their operation.

D. Chapters may collect annual dues of members of this corporation and such collections shall be remitted to the treasurer of this corporation within thirty (30) days of their receipt.

E. A chapter may request the corporation to include it in an annual group exemption letter addressed to the Internal Revenue Service. It shall then conform to the requirements of IRS.

F. Chapters may nominate or suggest agents for their locality but such nomination or suggestion shall not be binding on this corporation.

G. Chapters may assist their members in filling out proxies and may elect a representative to the annual meeting of members of this corporation but such representative may not cast more than his own vote plus the number of valid proxies he may have at that time.

Article IX — Amendments

These By-Laws may be amended, altered, changed, added to, or repealed by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members entitled to vote at any regular or special meeting of the members if notice of the proposed amendment, alteration, change, addition, or repeal be contained in the notice of the meeting.

Article — Quorum

Section 1. Presence in person or by proxy of 20% of the members of this corporation shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the members.

Section 2. Presence in person of 2/3 of the directors at any meeting of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum.

Article I — Rules of Order

Robert's Rules of Order, current edition, shall govern all matters not covered in these By-Laws.
